

A clause is a group of words that contains a verb and its subject.

There are two kinds of clauses, *independent* and *dependent*.

An **independent clause** expresses a complete thought and can stand by itself as a sentence.

A **dependent clause** does not express a complete thought and cannot stand alone as a sentence.



Noun and Adjective Clauses

A noun clause is a group of words that can stand alone as a sentence. A subordinate clause is dependent upon a larger clause that has the right to stand alone as a sentence. These are often used in complex clauses, subordinate clauses, compound clauses, and clauses of concession where one action is denied by another.

Adverb clauses are clauses that modify verbs, adjectives, or other clauses. They are often used in complex clauses to explain why something happened, how it happened, or what happened.

Adverb Clauses

A main clause is a group of words that can stand alone as a sentence. A subordinate clause is dependent upon a larger clause to stand alone as a sentence. There are different kinds of adverb clauses. As you see below, adverb clauses may be time clauses, place clauses, reason clauses, purpose clauses, and manner clauses.
